### John Mason Neale commemoration

Next year will be the 200<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the birth of John Mason Neale, on 24<sup>th</sup> January 1818. There will be small displays in the Library and the Museum in January to mark the occasion. The Town Council will dedicate one of the flower beds in the High Street to John Mason Neale. 'Cantu Amici' have very kindly offered to come to Sackville College Chapel on the evening of the actual day, Wednesday, 24<sup>th</sup> January to give a

concert. This will include the first public performance of a Cantata in honour of John Mason Neale, composed specially by George Clifford.

St Swithun's church will also mark the occasion with a Choral Evensong. Further details will follow.

#### From the Archives

At The Keep Archive, we read the Will of Ann Bartholomew, resident of Sackville College, dated 6<sup>th</sup> December 1722, in which Anne Bartholomew, spinster, being 'infirm of body but of parfitt mind and memory' left £11 to the son of one brother, one shilling apiece to the five children of another brother, only one shilling to a sister in law, and what little remained to her own sister. The will was witnessed by John Millington, Warden (1716-32). Millington was admitted as a pensioner in 1710, became Assistant Warden in 1715, even though the Assistant Wardens were not usually resident, then Warden in 1716.

Sometimes visitors have a family connection with Sackville College. A gentleman told John Monks that as a boy, he used to visit his great aunt, whom he identified in a photograph of the Queen Mother's visit in 1967. He described her room as 'warm, clean and cosy'.

A lady told Robin Whalley that her Grandmother and Great Grandmother had been residents at Sackville College, following the death of Great Grandfather, who was a coachman, in his 50s.

One of the Residents today remembers visiting her 'Little Friend' who was a Resident in the 1950s.

The daughter of 'Sam' Cyril John Howson, told me that during the 1970s, her father was able to grow vegetables in the garden at Sackville College, in return for ringing the bell every evening, presumably to sound the curfew. No money changed hands in this arrangement. He and his wife had a large family, because both had been left widowed with children. Their daughter

remembers riding in her father's wheelbarrow from their home in De La Warr Road to Sackville College.

These glimpses of the community in days gone by add to our understanding and knowledge of this community.

It is interesting to compare Sackville College with other almhouses. The Royal Magdalene Almshouses and St Margaret's Chapel, in Glastonbury, date from the 11th century.



Two rows of almshouses replaced the 'Hospital' in the 16<sup>th</sup> century. Almsfolk no longer live there. One furnished room is on show, with a bed on an upper section, reached by a ladder.

Dr Henry Rogers, Warden of Sackville College 1872-79. Mr Leppard has written extensively about Dr Rogers in the latest *Bulletin of the East Grinstead Society*, (120) November 2017. Sackville College Guides tend to regard Rogers, the former friend turned enemy of John Mason Neale, in a bad light. Rogers subsequently became Warden, himself, and founded the John Mason Neale Memorial Library in the Warden's Study. It will be very interesting to read a reappraisal of the life and work of Dr Rogers.
