Article by Mr Leppard about Dr Henry Rogers in The Bulletin of the East Grinstead Society

It is interesting to read about Dr Rogers, the friend turned enemy of John Mason Neale. Mr Leppard scrutinised all the sources about Rogers available to him in Autumn 2017 and produced a comprehensive, thought-provoking and very fair account of the life and work of Dr Rogers. Since then, more information has come to light. We look forward to reading some more about Dr Rogers in the forthcoming *Bulletin*, number 121.

Mr Leppard has also written 'The Unregarded Sussex of JM Neale', published in *Sussex*

Archaeological Collections 155 (2017), 165-179. This should be available to read at the public Library. Mr Leppard presents and discusses what Neale 'saw, heard and appreciated in the county, in his writings'. Neale loved Sussex: he knew most counties of England, but, apart from the Lake District and Devonshire, could name none that were 'the equal of Sussex'. Neale's words conjured up 'old picturesque villages, cresting the steep brow of a hill, with quaintly wrought gables...grey walls with copings that could remember Bosworth or Flodden fields and were perhaps leant against by village politicians who were discussing the wonderful news from France ...venerable farms niched in on the southern side of some sunny hill...'. Mr Leppard's article includes extracts from Neale's novels and interesting illustrations, to show that Neale, who recorded much that was 'unregarded' about Sussex in his day, himself deserves lasting regard in this county.

From the Archives:

In this anniversary year, 200 years since the birth of John Mason Neale, I include extracts from an unpublished letter of his, dated 1843, which came into my possession. Neale was by then married to Sarah, but they had no children, then. The couple spent 3 winters in Madeira, hoping to heal his weak chest. Here he began work on his History of the Eastern Church and continued with much other writing. On his last visit, he was given a puppy, Pombal, who became his constant companion. After Pombal's death he never owned another dog, and for 8 years he faithfully recorded the number of days since Pombal's death.

It was on a journey home from Madeira that the Neales stopped at Seville. He wrote in his Journal 'Up at 5 ½. 8 churches before breakfast.' This is a good example of his tremendous energy when well.

The letter is addressed to the Rev'd Thomas Grinfield (1788-1870).

My dear Mr Grinfield,

I promised to send you an account of ourselves. I wish you could see us in our quarters, enjoying the addition, which we never before had, of a garden. You know Funchal, with the amphitheatre of mountains, from the pictures. Up the steep road which leads to the Mount church you would clatter along, between wide undressed walls of brown iron stone at the top of which run corridors of vines and roses, to the classical look out in the white gardens terraced up the mountains. I have seldom been more happy than on finding myself so well off, after our seven days voyage, of which we were most heartily sick. You cannot think how I pity your November fogs and the cold drizzly days and unending showers.

With my kind regards to Mrs Grinfield and yourself & all your family, I remain Ever yours truly, J. Neale.

Dates for your Diary

Sunday, May 27th 2018, 3.30pm: Choral Evensong at St Swithun's Church, followed by a procession to Neale's grave and a hymn in the Sackville College Chapel. Then in Sackville College tradition, there will be a tea party in the Common Room. May 27th is the date when Neale took up his appointment as Warden, in 1846, so this is a very appropriate date for this event.
